<u> Ujima Project - Impact Report and Webinar</u>

Policy Paper Update

OAYPA's policy paper working group (Jane Kenny, Leslie Barraball, Suzanne Flier, Joanna Mendez, Bev MacKillop, Tamar Meyer) have been working closely with the Wilfred Laurier University (WLU) research team and we are pleased to announce that the data collection tools have been approved by WLUs Research Ethics Board.

We will be reaching out to Agency Leads in the next couple of weeks with recruitment materials (posters, social media posts) and email templates containing survey links for pregnant/parenting transition-aged youth and staff working in your agency. There will be a turnaround of **3 weeks** with the surveys, to meet our summer deadline.

This policy paper is a critical tool that OAYPA will use to advocate to government and other provincial partners for increased investments and other supports to our sector to achieve a comprehensive system of services for young parents and their children across the province.

<u>SickKids Study March 2024, Points to increased Rates of Premature Death for</u> Adolescent Mothers

This <u>study</u> (published March 2024) examined universal health care data for all females who were alive at age 12 years between 1991 and 2021 in Ontario. The study found that slightly more than 7% of the study population experienced at least 1 teen pregnancy and found that, compared with those with no teen pregnancy, those experiencing teen pregnancy (especially more than one) had a **higher risk of premature death**, **particularly of injury-related deaths**. The study considered factors including income, level of education, and comorbidities.

In a commentary on the study, Elizabeth Cook states:

"The findings of Ray et al are a sobering reminder that pregnant teens—instead of being judged for their decisions—should be encouraged to make decisions that they feel are best for themselves and be connected with supportive services to help them receive adolescent-friendly health care, complete their education, learn about healthy relationships, and receive mentoring from compassionate people... Teen pregnancy may offer an opportunity to intervene in the lives of people at higher risk of premature death, but knowing how best to offer support requires an understanding of the context of their lives. Collecting qualitative data about pregnant teens' experiences will help provide that context. But as a starting point, we must celebrate and listen to all pregnant young people so they can tell us what they need to live long, fulfilled lives."
