Anti-Oppressive Engagement with Pregnant and Parenting Young People

OAYPA is collaborating with Dr. Sherri Dutton to develop a toolkit for service providers, centering antioppressive practices when engaging with pregnant and parenting young people. As we know, young
parents often face systemic barriers, including stigma, discrimination, and inadequate access to
supportive services. Service providers play a critical role in addressing these challenges. However,
there is a pressing need for resources that equip professionals with strategies grounded in antioppressive frameworks. By collaborating on the creation of a toolkit, OAYPA can drive meaningful
change in service delivery, ensuring that pregnant and parenting young people receive equitable and

WHAT'S NEW

Ontario CWELCC Funding Formula Update

Over the past month childcare advocates have been evaluating the long-awaited child care funding formula. Providers share both excitement and concern. While, transitioning to a cost-based funding formula has been a win for the sector as it replaces a revenue-replacement model, it relies on outdated data and there are still issues with the implementation. The new formula also allows nonprofits to build up surplus revenue through revenue giving centres with low costs and more money to spend. Continued advocacy is necessary to encourage needs like capital funding and adequate staff compensation with wage grids that will help realize the true potential of the \$10/day childcare program

Dr. Junlei Li: Early Childhood Education Presentation

Early Relational Health; A Review of Research, Principles and Perspectives. This report was researched and written by a team led by Dr. Junlei Li of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, where he is a Senior Lecturer in Early Childhood Education and Co-Chair of the Human Development and Education Program. His research and practice involve understanding and supporting the work of people who serve children on the front lines of education and social services. Dr. Li presented to early educators in the Waterloo region in November. You can access that presentation here. YouthREX Young Parents Logic Model

In 2020, Healthy Teen Network created the <u>Young Parents Logic Model</u> as a guiding tool to aid youth-supporting professionals in the design and development of programs, services, and interventions, as well as in the continued improvement and evaluation of these activities. This model is not a program

map or a curriculum; rather, it is a resource, a tool, for designing and informing holistic programs and services for young families. The Young Parents Logic Model reflects, based on research, the most relevant goals, determinants, and behaviors. It focuses primarily on the behaviors and determinants of young people who are pregnant and/or parenting. While the needs of children of young parents are reflected in this logic model, the ultimate focus is on outcomes for their parent(s). As we know, positive outcomes for young parents lead to positive outcomes for their children and subsequently, positive outcomes for young families. **Thank you, Joanna Mendes (Jessie's) for sharing this resource!**

Black Mental Health Week

Ongoing learning and a commitment to improve understanding and initiate action to end anti-Black racism and the negative impact it has on mental health and access to care is important year-round. Below are some resources to support your learning, as well as organizations and initiatives that are providing important leadership in this space.

- <u>HOPE Strategy</u>: Infant, child, and youth mental health agencies in the city of Toronto formed a task force to develop a multi-year strategy to address anti-Black racism in the sector. This work includes a research report as well as a strategy to dismantle anti-Black racism in child and youth mental health in Toronto.
- Pathways to Care: Pathways to Care is a project led by the Black Health Alliance in partnership with TAIBU Community Health Centre, Wellesley Institute, the Centre for Addictions and Mental Health (CAMH), and Strides Toronto aimed at removing barriers and improving access to mental health and addictions services for Black children, youth and their families in 6 cities across Ontario.
- The Gifts of Our People Zine: The Gifts of Our People is an Affinity Group with The New Mentality (TNM) that was created in July of 2020 in response to the heavy climate of racism, police brutality and discrimination experienced that summer following the murder of George Floyd. In 2023, they published an online zine that captures their journey as an affinity group and the impact the group has had on Black, Indigenous and racialized youth in TNM's network. Through art, poetry, video and more, Zine highlights the importance of building brave spaces for racialized youth.
- <u>Black Excellence Community Library</u>: developed by Strides' Anti-Black Racism Task Force, this virtual library gives everyone an opportunity to share, celebrate and understand the impact of Black heritage and culture.
- <u>YouthREX Anti-Black Racism Virtual Training</u>: This free online certificate provides the Ontario youth sector with the foundational knowledge to cultivate practices, policies and alliances that challenge, disrupt and combat systematic anti-Black racism.
- <u>Introduction to Black Health and Disrupting Anti-Black Racism in Healthcare</u>: This free virtual webinar offered by Healthcare Excellence Canada and led by Dr. OmiSoore Dryden focuses on Black health through the exploration of the history of anti-Black racism in healthcare in Canada.
